GUIDE TO WRITING A PERSONAL STATEMENT



A personal statement is a common part of the raduate/professional school application process. The personal statement allows you to create a more complete picture of who you are as a person, in addition to your application and transcript. A personal statement should tell a story, your story.

Many schools will list topics to address on their application websites. Make sure that you answer all questions the school asks as well as provide some details about what makes you unique as a candidate. Some schools will not provide any criteria or the personal statement in this case, you have more reedom with your content, but re erence the "eneral advice" on the back pale of this handout or reater clarification about what to include in your statement.

Unless otherwise speci ied on the school's admission website, most personal statements are between 2-3 pa es in len th. Personal statements are typically 1.5 or double spaced and adhere to re ular one inch mar in space. Use a ont that is common and easy to read (Calibri, Times New Roman, etc.).

CAN I USE THE SAME PERSONAL STATEMENT FOR EVERY INSTITUTION I AM APPLYING TO?

You need to relate your experiences and quali ications to each individual institution. Make sure the reader knows why you are choosin their school and their pro ram. It is EXTREMELY important to answer all o the questions the school has posed in their essay prompt.

The personal statement needs to be tar eted to each individual school.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE PERSONAL STATEMENT AND THE STATEMENT OF PURPOSE? A statement o purpose will contain much o the same in ormation a personal statement contains (i.e. Your career oals, reasons or applyin to the pro ram, what you hope to learn, etc.), but a statement o purpose lacks the story tellin element o the personal statement. The personal statement is a more en a in and literary document, whereas a statement o purpose is typically a more concise way to answer the questions asked by the school.

THE HARDEST PART ABOUT WRITING A PERSONAL STATEMENT IS GETTING STARTED. BEFORE YOU START TYPING, THINK ABOUT THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS:

- What is unique or distinctive about you?
- Who are your role models or major in luences?
- What interests you about your ield?
- How have you learned throu h your ield?
- What other experiences have been in luential in colle e?
- What are your career oals?
- What do you need to explain (GPA, aps in education, etc.)?
- Have you overcome obstacles?
- What personal characteristics/skills do you possess?
- Why are you the ri ht candidate or admittance?

ANSWER THE QUESTIONS THAT ARE ASKED:

Lots o schools may ask or similar in ormation, but not all are the same. Use di erent statements or di erent schools, dependin on the requirements.

TELL YOUR STORY:

En a e the reader, use a writin style that is resh and active. Don't be a raid to use dialo ue and descriptive lan ua e. Back up statements with examples and details.

HAVE AN ANGLE:

Even i your li e has been less than dramatic, you still have a story to tell.

PAY SPECIAL ATTENTION TO YOUR "LEAD":

In the irst para raph, you will either rab attention or you will lose it. Use the lead to set the tone and direction or the statement.

SHOW THAT G
